<p>Study permit</p>	<p>The study permit is a document that allows foreign nationals to study at designated learning institutions (DLI) in Canada. Most foreign nationals need a study permit to study in Canada. <p>Working On Campus</p>	<p>International student in Canada must first meet specific requirements before they can begin working on campus or off campus. Please also visit the Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) website for information on how to work legally in Canada at: http://www.cic.gc.ca/english/study/work.asp</p>
<p>Working Off Campus</p>	<p>Certain students can work off campus without a work permit [R186(v)]. They can work part time (up to 20 hours a week) during a regular academic session and full time during regularly scheduled breaks between academic sessions. If you meet all of requirements, you can work off campus as an international student without a work permit. <p>Work in Canada after you graduate</p>	<p>Students may be eligible for a post-graduation work permit (PGWP) if they graduated from a designated learning institution (DLI) and want to stay in Canada temporarily to work.
